GRRC GMM Meeting 4/17/12

President Dave Newell called the meeting to order at 7:05pm on April 17, 2012 at Kraus-Hartig VFW, Spring Lake Park, MN with 65 members and five guests present.

Vice-President Kim Frick led the membership in the Pledge of Allegiance, which was followed by a moment of silence to honor the departed members and those serving in the military.

The minutes from the March GMM as published in the April issue of the newsletter were accepted as printed with a motion from Dave Secord and second by Lance Wells. Carried.

Executive Officer's Report – Bruce reminded everyone that all rounds must impact the berms.

Chief Instructor's Report - No report.

1st Readings – Steve Daniels, North Branch and Russell Good, North Branch. **2nd Readings** - Fred Dewall, Craig Walters, Don Schoff, Jeff Johnson. Robb Peterson was excused as he is in Colorado with the Juniors. Sergeant at Arms, Kurt Nelson, led the applicants, guests and non-members from the room. A motion to accept the Treasurer's Report as given was made by Lance Wells with second by Bruce Peglow. Carried. A motion to accept the Second Readings as a group was made by Jerry Sadowski. Second by Bruce Aune. Carried A motion to accept the group as members of GRRC was made by Dave Secord. Second by Lowell Rogers. The new members, and guests were led back into the room. The Vice President re-introduced

and welcomed five new members, with a reminder to see the Secretary following the meeting to pay the fees.

Committee Reports: Committees not otherwise listed had no report. **Action Arms**, Steven Shimek: PPS match this Saturday, which is similar to IPSC but is in miniature format. Time is 9:30 – 4:00pm. May 4th is the orientation for IPSC, with the USPSA classifier on Sat, May 5. Sunday, May 6 is the steel challenge. Monday, May 7 starts the USPSA Pistol League which ends in August.

All Around Match, Rich Williams: Kick-off for the 2012 Match Season is open to only GRRC members. There will be Open Sight and Hunter Classes. Everyone is on their own for scoring. Turn in your targets by 31Dec2012. Encouraged average shooters to enter. There will be an Open Shoot at the range on June 30.

Black Powder: Salad Shoot is 4/28 and 4/29.

Pistol: Steve reported for Bob that 12 bench rests were replaced, along with organization of the storage shed during the Spring Workday at the range. Also, cleaned up illegal brass - .223 are not allowed.

Schutzen: The first match will be May 5 and 6, with circa 1870's to WWI firearms.

Shotgun: May 2 starts the Wednesday Night Trap League. They will meet on Tuesdays when the GMM is held at the Red Shed. Discovered that the manl building on the Trap Range was not locked securely. Also, reminder to police the area before you leave.

Some of the current judgment errors include: shooting rifles at the pistol range, driving down the MP range to change targets, and shooting improvised targets placed on the ground and not in front of the backstops. Additional reminders include removing your trash, picking up your spent brass, and if you decide to kill a raccoon on the MP range- take the carcass with you. Please exercise plain good judgment. If something doesn't seem to be 100% safe, DON'T DO IT. When I see many of the shooting shows on TV, I always cringe in fear thinking that someone will try that at our range. It would be a shame for someone to lose their membership because of a stupid decision.

Spring Work Days: VP Kim Frick



The spring work days which were April 14 & 15 were well attended and many projects were started and completed over the weekend. Saturday started with the traditional Dave Anderson breakfast of sausages and pancakes with this year's limited maple syrup, and then the work teams split up and got to tasks.

Tom Bourke had camped with the Boy Scouts on Friday night and they were hungry when morning came around, so after breakfast they policed the road from the gate up to the highway. Bob Linder and Steve Shimik had a large crew on the pistol range building new shooting benches and cleaning up the ranges for another season. Kurt Borlag had a small crew on the KD range repairing the number boards that had blown down in the storm last year, and were continuing to clear debris from the range. Later, when the scouts had finished with the road cleanup, they also helped out on the range. Rut McGhee was surveying the damage to the north fence and making a list of the number of new posts needed and any other damage that needed to be repaired.

Dick Schaff had a crew painting and staining under the Black Powder cover and also helped in the construction of a small berm at the 40 yard line to set their targets on. Larry Sparks and his crew were hard at work on the shotgun range clearing branches and repairing damage also done by the storm. There is still a lot of wood down on the sides of the roads and piled everywhere from the storm damage. Rich Williams and a diehard crew of chain saw and wood splitters filled the wood shed and began a pile next to it barely making a dent in all the downed trees.

The concrete bench tops were moved from the rendezvous area to ranges where they could be utilized. The storage shed behind the 150yd line on MP range was excavated by Tom and his wonderful John Deere utility tractor (with bucket and backhoe) to help prepare for repair of that building. Of course the project I was glad to see get done was the new sign at the front gate. There has been some discussion about the need for such a sign, but the neighbors already know we are there, and if we have another emergency situation where the responders need to know our address, they will be able to find the property now.

There were many other things that got done on Saturday, as it was a beautiful day in the mid 60s and a perfect day to see what still worked and what needed to be repaired. Sunday turned wet and colder and the number of volunteers dropped to about a third of Saturday's group. It was a wet morning for the scouts. Most of the projects were completed on Saturday so the remaining group mainly congregated around the wood splitter which ran continuously for the two days.

I would like to thank everyone who took the time to help out on these projects and help keep up the range. It is a big place and needs constant maintenance. Special thanks to Tom with the tractor (who is on the waiting list) and Keith Goenner who helped me build a wood rack at the red shed and to all who lent a hand and completed a project.

Cutting the Range: Ron Rozeske

Grass cutting started at GRRC the first week in May. I thought I'd describe the process and the time frames for you in order to minimize any inconvenience in your use of the ranges.

Weather permitting we will cut the grass on Thursday of each week. If we get rained out on Thursday, we will cut on Friday. Our goal is to get the ranges cut first and then the associated parking areas and multi-use areas such as the "Park", campground and the area around the Red Shed.

We usually start around 0800 hrs but may start earlier unless the grass is really wet, in which case the start time will be later. The Multi-Purpose range is always cut first, followed by the Black Powder range. Each range is closed while it is being cut. Each of these two ranges takes about an hour to cut; thus, the MP range is usually available right around 0900 hrs with the BP range finished around 1000 hrs. I want to stress the word "usually" in the above sentence.

Once the MP and BP ranges are complete, we will cut the three bays on the pistol range. These usually take no more than 30 minutes for all three, so they should be done around 1100 or 1130 hrs. We can usually work around people shooting in the pistol bays as long as you are willing to quit shooting for 10 minutes while we cut the bay. If we can't work around you, we'll catch the bay later.

The KD range comes next starting around 1145 or 1200 hrs. We start at the pit and work back to the 600 yard area cutting the space around the number boards and the top of the pit, each berm and their associated walkways, and the parking area around the island shed. Normally, in addition to the 600 yard area, we also cut the "Park" and the parking area for the Pistol range while we are at the 600 yard berm. Once these are done, we move back to the KD range starting at the 800 yard berm and cut the 800 and 900 yard berms and walkways toward the Red Shed and the 1000 yard benches. The KD range and the areas leading up to it are usually finished between 1500 and 1600 hrs.

Lastly, we cut the campground, the parking area around the Red Shed and then finally the parking area for the MP and BP ranges if it has not already been cut. A special note regarding the campground: since it is somewhat of an unique area, we do not cut close to the campers. We will cut within six or eight feet of each camper if we can and then the open spaces near the picnic shelter and the shower and sauna.

So to summarize, we plan:

- to cut the MP range from 0800 to 0900 hrs.
- . to cut the BP range from 0900 to 1000 hrs.
- . to cut the Pistol bays from 1030 to 1100 hrs.
- . to cut the KD range from 1130 to 1500 hrs.

We are normally finished by 1800 hrs.

Those of you that use the KD range, if the grass on the berms is too long or too short- let me know. We will start out cutting it the same height as last year. If there are any questions I can be reached at 651-746-9503.

M-1 For Vets Event at GRRC July 14

This July 14th the Highpower boys will be putting on benefit rifle matches and barbeque for the M1 for Vets Program. The **M1 for Vets Project** is a Non-Profit Organization which is dedicated to providing Combat Injured Veterans of Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF), Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF) and the Global War on Terror (GWT) the opportunity to compete in National, Regional and Local marksmanship competitions and training.

To accomplish this, the Project provides logistical and financial support to complete this mission. The **Adaptive Marksmanship Program** is a core part of the M1 for Vets Project; it provides the opportunity and skill development for combat-injured vets to compete in National, Regional and Local marksmanship competitions and training venues. This Project includes a high level of training, competition, camaraderie, and healing for these competitors, allowing them to recover mentally and physically from their injuries, helping them to re-integrate back into society.

Some have asked specifically how we are able to have our veterans, many with severe physical disabilities, shoot at competitive events and get scores that are competitive with some of the best shooters in the world at Camp Perry. The answer is the **dedication**, **drive**, **and the level of commitment** these veterans show to achieving their goals of recovery, marksmanship, and the desire to not let their disabilities hold them back from their goals. To help these veterans further, M1 for Vets petitioned for the below rule modification to allow those veterans who are physically unable to handle the positional changes of three position high-power competitive shooting.

The following rule change was implemented in 2010, prior to this rule change, these Veteran shooters scores would not be considered due to the fact that they did not "stand" to sit or lay back down in the rapid fire stages of these matches:

CMP RULE 8.1.6 Enacted January 2010

Special Exception: In recognition of their extreme sacrifice to our country, military or former military members who were awarded the Purple Heart for injuries sustained in combat that resulted in partial or complete loss (or replacement)of lower extremities, will be allowed to remain in position for rapid fire stages, and still be eligible to earn EIC points and win National Trophies.

Competitors who start rapid-fire stages in position must load on command. They may not shoulder the rifle until the targets rise and they may not fire a shot until after a shooter who was standing fires the first shot.

M1 for Vets Mission The goal is to give transitioning combat wounded veterans an opportunity to get back on the rifle range to participate in shooting competitions. M1 for Vets will make logistical and equipment arrangements and work with them to make the adjustments that are necessary to achieve a stable firing position. These are tough young men and women that quickly adapt and are able to compete on the firing line at National, Regional and local rifle and pistol matches.

High Power Clinic at GRRC 4/21: Tom Torborg



On Saturday April 21st the high power boys held their annual **High Power Clinic**. We had a full class of 21 shooters from across the state. One student came all the way from Pequot Lakes and another from Atwater. Those cities are over two-hour drives one way from the range so they had to leave pretty early to make the 8:00 am start time.

We had to limit the class size to 21 because of the availability of qualified coaches. We had to turn a couple of people away who wanted to sign up simply because we didn't have the coaches for them. We also had to turn away some club members who just showed up without prior notice- again because of the lack of coaches. As an FYI to all members, if a class, clinic or camp is listed on the schedule, do not assume you can just show up and participate. You should always contact the person listed as the in the schedule to check on availability. These events are not included in your club membership.

This year's focus was shifted from the traditional *Across the Course* NRA style matches to the more popular *CMP Games* events. This style offers more leeway in the type of rifle that is allowed. Basically any vintage military rifle in "as-issued" condition can be used. All firing is done from the 200 yard line. There is also a modern military class so there is something for everyone.



Most people taking the clinic used M1 rifles. We had a father and son use a Mosin-Nagant and another student used a Swedish Mauser. The high score of the day was 267 out of a possible 300, fired by a student with an AR-15. There were several M1 shooters nipping at his heels but his offhand score put him over the top. This allowed the students to learn firsthand that a match is won in the slow fire stage and lost in the offhand (unsupported) stage. You have to be able to hold it together for the entire match.

The rain threatened all morning. It started with a mist that wasn't that big of a deal. Then it progressed to a drizzle that would come and go. Towards the last stages the drizzle became more consistent. By the end it was downright raining but all students were able to finish the entire match.

We finished the day back at the red shed were the usual "If I had only" and "What I should have done" stories were traded back and forth. All in all a good day at the range.
